

Essential Concepts	Second Grade: Sacraments, Mass
TRINITY: God the Creator; Jesus the Redeemer; and Holy Spirit as Sanctifier [249-324, 683-701, 727-730]	Name and describe the Trinity as three Persons in one God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Identify God the Father as the Creator , Jesus as the Son and Savior (Redeemer) , and the Holy Spirit as sharing the love and grace of God.

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THE CREED: A Statement of Our Belief [185-1065]	Define the term, Creed , as a statement (profession) of our Church beliefs. Know the Nicene Creed is the one we usually profess at Sunday Mass and the Apostles Creed is recited with the Rosary.

TASK OF CATECHESIS 2 – LITURGICAL EDUCATION: *Students recognize the presence of Christ and enter into communion with Him through active, full, and conscious participation in the Liturgical celebrations and Sacraments of the Church.*

Essential Concepts	Second Grade: Sacraments, Mass
<p>EUCCHARIST: Who, How, When, and Where the Mass is Celebrated [1135-1167, 1322-1419]</p>	<p>Associate the term liturgy with Mass and the public (community) worship of the Church.</p> <p>Know that Sunday is the Lord’s Day, when we participate in Mass to worship, praise, thank God, and rest.</p> <p>Sing/recite Mass responses with other students.</p> <p>Reverentially demonstrate appropriate liturgical gestures when participating in liturgy.</p> <p>Recognize that ministers of the altar (priests, deacons, altar servers) wear vestments.</p> <p>Identify and name liturgical items used during the Mass including: Lectionary; Book of Gospels (Evangelary); Roman Missal; chalice; paten; hosts; ambo; altar; and Presider’s chair.</p> <p>Identify the two major parts of the Liturgy: Liturgy of the Word and Liturgy of the Eucharist.</p> <p>Recognize that at the beginning of Mass, we tell God we are sorry for our sins and receive God’s forgiveness for venial sins (Penitential Act).</p> <p>Recognize that the Mass is the celebration of the Paschal Mystery, the life, death, and Resurrection of Jesus Christ.</p> <p>Recognize that the stories of Jesus in the Gospels are proclaimed during Mass.</p> <p>Recognize the homily as when the priest or deacon helps us understand the scripture stories we hear during Mass.</p> <p>Recognize that in the Mass we give thanks for all of God’s gifts, especially for the gift of His Son, Jesus Christ.</p> <p>Recognize that at the prayer over the gifts of bread and wine we present these gifts to God and ask Him to consecrate them.</p> <p>Explain that the priest presides at the Eucharistic liturgy and he consecrates the bread and wine that become the Body and Blood of Jesus.</p> <p>Distinguish the difference between bread and wine and the Body and Blood of Christ.</p> <p>Recognize the connection between the Last Supper and the celebration of Mass.</p> <p>Exhibit reverence for Holy Communion as the Real Presence of Jesus Christ present under the appearance of bread and wine.</p> <p>Recognize that the priest ends the Mass by sending us forth to love and serve others.</p>

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<p>CELEBRATION OF THE SACRAMENTS [1210-1666]:</p> <p>Sacraments of Initiation [966-977, 1212-1419]</p> <p>Sacraments of Healing [979-987, 1420-1484]</p> <p>Sacraments at the Service of Communion [1533-1666]</p>	<p>Describe the meaning of a sacrament as effective signs of God's grace.</p> <p>Define grace as a gift from God that helps each of us grow in holiness.</p> <p>Name the seven sacraments.</p> <p>List the three Sacraments of Initiation.</p> <p>Explain that Baptism is the first sacrament and it is followed by the other sacraments.</p> <p>Identify Baptism with forgiveness of Original Sin and the gift of new life in the Holy Spirit as the children of God.</p> <p>Associate the Sacraments of Healing: Penance/Reconciliation and Anointing of the Sick as sacraments in which they encounter Jesus, the Healer.</p> <p>Identify and explain in own words the essential elements in the Rite of receiving the Sacrament of Penance/Reconciliation, including examination of conscience, confession of sin, assignment of penance, prayer of contrition, absolution, and performance of penance.</p> <p>Be able to examine one's conscience.</p> <p>Explain absolution as God forgiving their sins in the Sacrament of Reconciliation and Penance.</p> <p>Prepare for and participate in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.</p> <p>Identify and describe the two Sacraments in Service of Communion: Holy Matrimony/Marriage and Holy Orders.</p> <p>Recognize matrimony/marriage is between one man and one woman, who together make a promise to be partners for life and open to the gift of children.</p> <p>Recognize that some men are called to serve the Church as deacons, priests, or bishops.</p>

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<p>LITURGICAL RESOURCES:</p> <p>Liturgical Calendar [1163-1173]</p>	<p>Identify major liturgical seasons by name and color and associate them with the birth, life, ministry, Passion, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension of Jesus Christ.</p> <p>Recognize Holy Week and Easter as the holiest days of the year, when we remember Jesus' Passion, Death, and Resurrection—the Paschal Mystery.</p>

<p>Liturgical Symbols and Sacramentals [1179-1199, 1667-1679]</p>	<p>Associate the terms, Feast Days and Memorials as days honoring Mary and the Saints in the Liturgical Calendar.</p>
<p>Divine Office/Liturgy of the Hours [1174-1175]</p>	<p>Identify sacramentals as holy actions and objects and describe some of them, such as, laying on of hands, genuflecting, sign of the cross, blessed ashes, blessed medals, and blessed candles.</p>
<p>Liturgical Rites: Weddings [1621-1637]; Funerals [988-1029, 1680-1690]; and Blessings [1671-1673]</p>	<p>Distinguish sacramentals from sacraments.</p>
	<p>Make the Sign of the Cross when responding to the invitatory, “Lord open my lips” with “And my mouth will proclaim your praise.</p>
	<p>Prayerfully listen to and/or antiphonally recite Psalm 23*.</p>
	<p>Recognize that Catholic marriage (Holy Matrimony) is a sacrament with special blessings that takes place in a Church.</p>
	<p>Recognize that Christian funerals are celebrations of our life in Christ.</p>

TASK OF CATECHESIS 3 – MORAL FORMATION: *Students develop a moral conscience that is informed by Church teachings and conformed to Christ, as modeled in a personal life of virtue, and demonstrated in service of the Gospel's demands for society.*

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<p>THE HUMAN PERSON: [26-48, 1691-1876, 1928-1948]:</p> <p>Made in the Image of God: – Foundation of Human Dignity [355-368, 703-706, 1004, 1700-1876]</p> <p>Made for Happiness with God, Beatitudes [1218-1229, 1716-1717, 2284-2291]</p> <p>Human Freedom and Conscience Formation [1030-1037, 1730-1802]</p> <p>Covenant and Ten Commandments [2052-2557]</p> <p>Virtues: Cardinal and Theological [1803-1845, 2656-2662]</p>	<p>Identify Eucharist as a great gift of Jesus in fulfilling our human desire to be close to God.</p> <p>Know that our bodies and souls are created by God, in His image and likeness, and need to be respected by ourselves and others (human dignity).</p> <p>Know that we are made in God's image and likeness to know, love, and serve God and to be happy with Him forever.</p> <p>Understand how following God's rules, helps us to be happy, healthy, and holy.</p> <p>Understand that God gave us an intellect and free will to choose what is right and avoid what is evil.</p> <p>Identify conscience as God's gift to help us distinguish between right and wrong.</p> <p>Understand and experience an examination of conscience.</p> <p>Know the Ten Commandments are laws given to us by God to help us respect God and love one another.</p> <p>Describe God's Covenant Relationship in own words.</p> <p>Name and describe a virtue.</p> <p>Recognize virtues, as how God helps us form good habits.</p> <p>Recognize that God's presence helps us to grow in virtue and grace.</p>

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<p>THE HUMAN COMMUNITY [1877-1948, 2204-2213]:</p> <p>Personal and Social Sin [1846-1876]</p>	<p>Recognize that God made humans to live in community with one another and also to be responsible for the needs of others.</p> <p>Demonstrate understanding of human dignity, by respecting the rights of others.</p> <p>Know the difference between sin and an accident or mistake.</p> <p>Distinguish the difference between temptation, and sin.</p> <p>Define sin as a choice we make to turn away from God and repentance as turning back to God.</p> <p>Distinguish venial sin from mortal sin.</p>

Catholic Social Teaching: Consistent Ethic of Life; Love of neighbor; and Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy [2419-2449]

Give examples of how sin affects our relationship with God, neighbor, and creation.

Discuss how the Sacrament of Reconciliation/Penance helps us say we are sorry for our sins and forgives them.

Recognize that God forgives our sins no matter how serious they are through the Sacrament of Reconciliation/Penance.

Recognize that God's grace helps us to avoid sin.

Identify the Penitential Rite during the liturgy as a time to show sorrow for sin and to ask God for forgiveness. (Lord, have mercy.)

Associate care of personal and shared resources in home, parish, and school with taking caring of God's gift of creation.

Reflect and discuss on how we can assist those in need (such as donating some allowance money to a Parish program serving the poor).

TASK OF CATECHESIS 4 – LEARNING TO PRAY: *Students experience and engage in Catholic expressions of prayer to deepen their relationship with God and the Church.*

<p>Essential Concepts</p> <p>EXPRESSIONS OF PRAYER, PROCESS Personal and Shared; Vocal; Singing; and Meditation [2700-2724]</p>	<p>Second Grade: Sacraments, Mass</p> <p>Recognize that we pray alone and with others.</p> <p>Demonstrate ability to pray alone during quiet time in class.</p> <p>Recognize that we pray with the community of the Church especially at Mass on Sunday.</p> <p>Participate in a guided reflection on a passage from Sacred Scripture (Lectio Divina).</p>

<p>THE CHURCH IN GOD’S PLAN [731-780]</p> <p>Church History [464, 758-780]</p>	<p>Locate and name places where Jesus was born, lived, died and rose from the dead using a map of the Holy Land (e.g., Bethlehem, Nazareth, Galilee, and Jerusalem).</p> <p>Recognize the Roman Catholic Church is over 2,000 years old.</p>

<p>MODELS OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH: [781-810]:</p> <p>People of God [781-786]</p> <p>Body of Christ [787-796]</p> <p>Temple of the Holy Spirit [733-747, 797-801]</p>	<p>Recall that we are part of the Roman Catholic Church and a Parish community where we worship God and help others.</p> <p>Recognize their Parish as where the People of God come to worship God and serve others.</p> <p>Recognize that their family is part of the People of God and called to be a domestic Church (Church in our home).</p> <p>Recognize ways we share God’s gifts and serve others as members of the Body of Christ (1 Cor 12).</p> <p>Recognize that we are Temples of the Holy Spirit, because the Holy Spirit lives inside of us and guides us to be holy (1 Cor 6:19-20).</p>

<p>THE MYSTERY AND MARKS OF THE CHURCH: One; Holy; Catholic; and Apostolic [811-870]</p>	<p>Recognize the Catholic Church is holy because it was founded by Christ and is guided by the Holy Spirit.</p>

<p>CHRIST’S FAITHFUL—HIERARCHY, LAITY, CONSECRATED LIFE [871-945]</p> <p>Church Order: The Hierarchy and Magisterium and Infallibility [874-896]</p> <p>The Laity: Rights and Responsibilities [897-913, 2041]</p> <p>The Domestic Church [1655-1658, 1666, 2204-2257, 2685]</p> <p>The Universal Call to Holiness [2013-2014, 2028, 2813]</p>	<p>Understand that the Pope leads the Catholic Church, our Archbishop leads our Archdiocese, and our Pastor leads our Parish.</p> <p>Describe why it is important to go to Mass each Sunday and to receive the sacraments of Eucharist and Reconciliation often.</p> <p>Describe how their family prays at Mass and also at home, such as before meals and at bedtime (domestic Church).</p> <p>Recognize how the sacraments help us to stay close to God and to be holy.</p>

Vocation: Holy Matrimony/Marriage; Priesthood; and Religious Life [914-933]	Identify the meaning of vocation as a calling and gift from God. Recognize that everyone has a vocation , which is lived out in unique ways in life and is a response to God's plan for us.

TASK OF CATECHESIS 6 – MISSIONARY DISCIPLESHIP AND SERVICE: *Students acquire and demonstrate skills to recognize their gifts from God and their vocation to share the Good News of Jesus Christ in word and deed in the world.*

CALL TO STEWARDSHIP AND SERVICE: Catholic Social Teaching about the common good [1905-1948, 2419-2422]	Recognize we serve God by sharing our gifts with the community, according to our age and abilities (stewardship). Recognize we have responsibilities to care for all our neighbors throughout the world.

CALL TO ECUMENISM, INTERRELIGIOUS DIALOGUE, AND THE NEW EVANGELIZATION [848-860, 927-933, 905, 2044,2472]	Identify some of the ways that Jesus showed compassion during His life on Earth. Understand that all people belong to God. Know that God also loves people who may go to different churches than ours. Recognize that people express their belief in God in many different ways. Know that our faith is a gift from God that we can share with others.
