The Archdiocese of Seattle Settles Christian Brother Abuse Case from 1962

Seattle, WA Dec 5, 2019 - The Archdiocese of Seattle recently reached final settlement for a 1962 case involving a member of the Christian Brothers of Ireland.

On November 4, 2019, the Archdiocese of Seattle reached a settlement for \$300,000 for a case involving allegations of sexual abuse by Br. G. A. Kealy, who is now deceased. Br. Kealy was a former teacher and administrator at O'Dea High School, an Archdiocese of Seattle school, which was administered by the Christian Brothers of Ireland at that time. The Christian Brothers, a now bankrupt religious order, is a separate entity from the Archdiocese of Seattle.

Br. Kealy is included in the Archdiocese's List of Clergy and Religious Brothers and Sisters for Whom Allegations of Sexual Abuse of a Minor Have Been Admitted, Established or Determined to Be Credible, originally published in January 2016.
